A PERSPECTIVE OF MISGA By Joe Gambatese*

MISGA has only one purpose: to stimulate greater enjoyment and participation in golf by senior golfers. It strives to achieve this by developing good senior golf programs at each club and widening the social contacts among Seniors of different clubs through mixers, member-quests and other events. Indirectly, MISGA membership has resulted in increased revenues to clubs and golf shops through cart fees, golf shop prizes, and food and beverage service.

MISGA had its beginning in 1964 when Kenwood and Lakewood Seniors began getting together for social golf with other clubs. Last year membership had grown to 11 clubs with 560 Seniors all with active Senior programs. They held 44 mixers. An interclub and two-man team champat Potomac Valley. 1977 began with a successful Spring Fling at Myrtle Beach, S.C., the week of March 27. Membership had grown to 28 clubs with more than 1,000 seniors. With this growth, MISGA is reorganizing into four area groupings representing Washington, Baltimore, Western Maryland and the Easter Shore (Delmarva) Each are will have its own officers and run F. Buddle: Montg. Village, Pr. George, Tantallon its own program under over-all MISGA guidance.

> Thanks for much of MISGA's progress goes to Boards of Directors of member clubs for recognizing the value of MISGA membership and extending privileges of their clubs, including the waiving of green fees for MISGA events.

BOARD LISTS 1978 OBJECTIVES

At its annual meeting March 10 the MISGA Board of Directors set the following objectives for the coming year:

- 1. There should be a designated day each week for Seniors' golf; and that at least once a month on Seniors' day, seniors from other clubs may be invited to play without paying greens fees
- 2. Guidelines for Mixer Events have been revised and updated. Clubs are urged to modify them to meet local conditions.
- 3. MISGA recommends that 1978 USGA handicap rules be used for senior play.
- 4. Mixers will be played in accordance with the host club rules and policies. Some of these include use of carts, date and time of play, type of tournament, deadlines for exchanging names and handicaps of participants, dining space and other requirements pertinent to the scheduled or unscheduled Mixer.
- 5. Mixers are to be evaluated by the host club designated representative by filling out and mailing the new Mixer Report Form to the Treasurer within 48 hours.
- 6. To make it possible for everyone to finish about the same time for lunch and get acquainted mixers should be played, if at all possible, with a "limited" shotqun start.
- 7. Establish a Committee of Concern that will contact sick members by phone, cards or visits.
- 8. Publish a roster of Seniors which includes name, address, and telephone number. The Board would appreciate receiving three copies for use by the President, Secretary and the Director of Communications.

NEW REPORTING PROCEDURE

Mixer Report Forms were distributed to all MISGA clubs' designated representatives at the March 10 Annual Spring Meeting. These reports are to be completed by the host clubs and mailed within 48 hours after each Mixer to the Treasurer with the club's 10% contribution for MISGA's expenses.

The reports will be used by Joe Gambatese as part of his continuing evaluation of club programs.

SENIOR PROGRAMS VARY IN MEMBER CLUBS

Information received from 21 of MISGA's 27 clubs reveals the following:

- --18, or 85% have a formalized seniors program
- --11, or 52% the program is run by a committee, with a chairman in charge.
- --10, or 48% a seniors' chairman runs the program without a committee.
- --7, or 33% charge an annual seniors' fee. All but one charge \$2. The other charges \$5.
- --10, or 48% have a seniors' tournament schedule
- --15, or71% register the senior participants for roster purposes.
- --The minimum age limit is 55 at 10 clubs; 53 at 1 club; and 50 at 6 clubs.
- --11 clubs have a regular seniors day; 10 weekly and one monthly.
- --10, or 48% have a free guest seniors day. At 8 clubs it is one day a month, at 1 it is 3 per month, and an another it is weekly.
- --The total number of participating senior golfers at the 21 responding clubs is 992, an average of slightly over 47 per club.

We hope that surveys such as this may be useful to your club's senior program. A similar survey will be conducted annually.

SURVEY SHOWS THAT MISGA ADDS TO MEMBER CLUBS' INCOME By T. Perry Lippitt

The Senior Golf Program at Kenwood CC was begun 4 years ago to provide organized competition among Seniors, to further their interest in golf and the Club and to encourage friendship among them.

Tuesday was chosen as Seniors Day since it was a day on which no other golf activities were scheduled. Every tuesday during the Season (April 1 - October 31) we have a competition for Seniors: i.e., sweepstakes, Pinehurst, 2-man team, best ball of foursome, etc. Every third Tuesday of the month is Member-Guest Day. Green fees are waived, but a cart or caddie must be

used. In other words, the Senior and his guest cannot pull or carry their clubs. Each member is allowed one guest a month. The guest must be a senior and belong to a Club with and recognized by the USGA.

On Tuesdays, the first tee is reserved for Seniors from 8:30 a.m. for approximately two hours. However, a Senior may compete in our events provided that he tees off by 2 p.m. This deadline is imposed so that the results will be in by 6 p.m. and the Committee can determine the winners and the distribution and the results can be posted the following morning.

MISGA evolved from these Member-Guest days. In our first year of Senior activities we invited approximately 20 Seniors from Lakewood and from VFW to play at Kenwood. They in turn invited us to their Clubs and we enjoyed the competition and companionship so much that Al Hagen came up with the idea of forming an organization which is now known as MISGA;

At Kenwood we charge \$2 to enter each Senior event. We skim off the top 20% of the fees collected and distribute the rest in prizes. The 20% is then used at the end of the season to defray the cost of a luncheon, shot-gun start, and free beer after play. We have a shotgun start on this day at I p.m. and usually y a scramble averaging 64 players or four

rsomes. Kenwood also pays its dues to MISGA out of this fund.

Statistics for 1977.

1. 38 events were played, including four mixers and 7 member guests.

2. 1369 rounds of golf were played, 275

guests.

3. \$2,316.00 worth of merchandize prizes were awarded, including \$347.00 from mixers.

4. Approximately 617 riding carts used.

As you can see from the above statistics, much revenue is generated by the Seniors for Kenwood from rental of carts, lunches and drinks. Also the Golf Shop's revenues are increased substantially.

Maryland Seniors Return

After an enjoyable visit here last year, the Maryland Interclub Seniors Golf Association held its second annual 'spring fling at five Grand Strand golf courses. in the party, which spent the last six days here, were 96 people, with 80 golfers, (54 men and 26 women), 15 men and women non-golfers.

As was the case last year, the group was headed by Al Hagan, of Silver Springs, Md., who is president of the Association. "We were treated so nice last year, and had such a good

time we decided to return," Hagan stated.

After three different types of tourneys the first three days, the individual championships were played the final two days. The title matches were at Eagle Nest and Litchfield, the golfers playing each course once and then totaling the two rounds for a two-day gross.

The two 1978 champions are both members of the Lakewood Country Club in Rockville, Md., namely, Bob Davis the low gross winner with 84-83-167, and, Willis Warren, low net on 78-67-

Other low gross leaders included John Mycek, 170; and Tom McAndrews, 171. After Warren in the net category, it was Marlowe Cline, 147; Frank Koby, 148; Chester Mills, 149 and Alex Craw, 152.

'The opening day "Scramble" was at Sea Guil with the winners scoring 69, which was the foursome of Pat Staubs, Herb Meyer, Al Schaffer and Randy Scholl.

The group then played Skyway the second day with the format being a "best ball of foursome" which was taken by the learn consisting of Pat Staubs, W.L. McPherson; Pat Boyle and Charles Apelents with a net 59.

The third day was spent at Myrtle Beach National in a "two-man team, best-ball" event that had six teams just a stroke

apart for the top honors.

With a 62 "best ball," the winning duo was made up of Mike Barnes and Bob Earman. Five teams were next with 63 each, namely, Alex Craw-Joe Craw; Maurice Ward-Wally Sager; Pat Staubs-Don McGirk; Marlowe Cline-Wayne Forts, and, Frank Koby-Dick Zapf.

Seniors association boosts clubs' income

Some 28 golf clubs in Maryland have increased their revenue through activities of the new Maryland Interclub Seniors Golf Association. MISGA was organized under the leadership of President Al Hagen of Lakewood Country Club to promote golf fellowship and activity through organizing social golf "mixers," in which the clubs arrange home-and-home golf tournaments with seniors from four or five other clubs.

Green fees are waived, but clubs have derived as much as \$5,000 in revenue in one season from golf cars, pro shop prizes, and food and beverage service. And it makes

club membership more attractive to senior members.

1977 MISGA FALL CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENTS

GUIDELINES FOR MIXER EVENTS - 1978

1. Each MISGA club elects a designated representative for administering its programs. This official will establish firm "home" and "away" mixer dates.

Upon receipt of the annual MISGA playing schedule, club representatives are responsible for contacting each other and establishing mutually acceptable "home" and "away" playing dates. Each club representative will post and announce his club's annual schedule on the Senior's bulletin board and through other club communications.

2. Team captain(s) for each event to be designated.

The MISGA club representative will designate a team captain for each event. Assistants will be designated by the team captain (or club representative) as necessary. Each club representative will contact each of the other club representatives on his schedule and exchange the name, address and phone number of the team captain appointed for his mixer.

These men will also get the names and handicaps of guests, including Montgomery Village C.C. cart use, one week prior to the mixer event. The number of guests may be limited to the number of senior participants established by the host club. Also determine the number of guests who will stay for lunch.

3. Post notices on the "senior" bulletin Board.

Prepare a notice which announces the mixer event; include the date, identity of the host and guest clubs, starting times, team captains. The sign-up sheet should be posted at each club at least two weeks before the mixer. It should contain columns for names, handicaps and cart use.

Coordinate the mixer event with the necessary club committees by providing identity of guest club, number of guests and date.

- 4. Coordinate with the Pro Shop Arrange for electric carts, gift certificates and starting times.
- 5. Coordinate with the Club Manager Resolve need for lockers, number staying for lunch and check on status of reciprocal chit signing.
- 6. Coordinate with the starter Provide the identity of all pairings to include guests and members. Establish starting times with him.

7. Mixer Event Details:

a. Type of compatition should be determined in accordance with the "balance" of the number of host entries versus the number of guest entries. If the number of guest and host entries are equal in number the play should be two-man teams, each guest to be pairedwith a host member. If the number of host entries exceeds the number of guests, three man or four man teams may be formed. The options should be resolved via discussion between the two club team captains. To the extent possible the captains will arrange

pairings so that players of approximately the same handicaps will play together.

b. Prize distribution will try to reach approximately 25% of the players. Normally each participant will pay a fee of \$2 to play. Ten percent of this money will be withdrawn for MISGA overhead expenses - the balance to be used for pro shop prizes. If 40 players contributed \$80 for prizes the distribution could be: \$8 for MISGA; with 5 teams of 10 players receiving 30% 1st prize; 25% 2nd prize; 20 percent 3rd prize; 15% 4th prize and 10% 5th prize.

Options:

Ties can be determined on the basis of a match of cards beginning with the first hole; or the money can be divided between the tied teams.

A new prize distribution may be determined after play is completed.

8 Miscellaneous Suggestions:

- a. Prepare sample score cards in advance. Determine who should collect the \$2 entry fee as the teams arrive.
- b. Officials should greetguests upon arrival and instruct them as to parking unloading of clubs, lockers, registration, availability of facilities, etc.
- c. Two officials should tee off in the first group so that they will finish in time to post scores .
- d. Determine who will stay for lunch at restration time and advise club management.
- e. To the extent possible riding carts will be shared by "home" and "visitor" players. The sharing of carts by the members of the same club should be avoided.
- f. Home club members are urged to remain for lunch and the distribution of prizes.
 - q. The host club should provide the most direct and/or easiest route to his club
- 9. Upon conclusion of the event, club representatives will complete the MISGA MIXER REPORT form and forward 10% of gross receipts to MISGA's treasurer as indicated on the form. Each host club representative will retain a record of each "home" event for later consolidation and use with club management and MISGA.

PROCEDURES FOR MISGA INTERCLUB MIXERS

IF LAKEWOOD IS THE HOST CLUB

availability to participate.

A. Mixer Committee:

Mixer committee chairman should make initial contact with other club representative approximately 4 weeks prior to mixer to verify date and starting time and obtain information as to probable number of golfers from the other club.

- 1. Post sign÷up sheet on Seniors' bulletin board at least 3 weeks prior to each mixer showing:
 - a. Cut-off time for eligibility (generally 6:00 p.m. on the Saturday prior to the event); b. Statement as to number of Lakewood golfers who can be accommodated for the mixer. Those signing after cutioff time or those in excess of the specified number will be considered as alternates in order in which they signed). All stand-bys not accommodated will be given preferential treatment for the next following mixer if they declare their
- 2. Arrange for telephone committee to contact (on Sunday prior to the mixer) those who signed up to determine if they plan to participate, and to contact an appropriate number of alternates if the latter are needed.
- 3. On Monday prior to mixer, Lakewood committee chairman should contact representative of visiting club to obtain the number, the names, and the handicaps of the visiting golfers, together with the names of those who prefer to walk.
- 4. Lakewood mixer chairman will determine mixer format (2-man or 4-man teams depending on the number of golfers from each club). As a general proposition each team must have at least one member from the visiting club.
- 5. In conjuction with representative of visiting club, Lakewood mixer chairman will make pairings and assign starting tees for each team.
- 6. Prepare cards showing the names of the riders assigned to each cart and the number of the tee on which those players will start. Name cards should be affixed to the carts prior to 9:00 A.m. on the day of the mixer.
- 7. Not later than noon on the day prior to the mixer, notify golf professional of the anticipated number of golfers, the number of carts required, and the number of tees required for modified shot-gun start (start with No. 1 and work back 18,17,16 etc.) Golf professional should be requested to line up carts in the first lane of the parking lot and they should be in place by 9:00 a.m.
- 8. Notify starter of the starting time, the number of golfers involved, and the number of tees from which play will begin. (Starter should be reminded that every fourth starting time (on the first tee) shall be made available to any Lakewood member who is present and ready to tee off; also that members have the option to tee off on the back nine immediately after the "shot gun foursome" has teed off on the last designated hole.
- 9. The golf shop collects for carts and entry fees for pro shop prizes. The committee does the scoring and determines the awards.
- 10. Arrange for official score sheet and scorers (one from each club), and prepare sample score cards for each team.

11. Determine number and dollar value of prizes. Notify golf professional of the names of the winners and post winners' list on Seniors' bulletin board.

12. Notify Men's Grill of the number of participants.

13. Furnish Reception Committee chairman with the names of the visiting golfers and a list of the pairings.

B. Reception Committee:

1. Reception committee members will greet visiting golfers as they arrive in the parking lot and escort them to their assigned carts. Walkers should be taken to the first tee area. Visiting golfers should be introduced to their team members from Lakewood.

IF LAKEWOOD IS THE VISITING CLUB

A. Mixer committe shall:

- 1. Verify date and starting time for each event and ascertain number of Lakewood golfers who can be accommodated. Post this information on the sign-up sheet.
- 2. At least 2 days prior to the mixer furnish to the host club representative the names an handicaps of the Lakewood golfers, specifying those who prefer to walk. (This information should be obtained through the telephone committee). Lakewood committee chairman should assist the host club representative in establishing appropriate pairings if requested to do so.
- Assist host club representative in signing in our Lakewood golfers and providing such other assistance as he may require.
- 4. Ascertain and post on the Seniors' bulletin board the most direct and/or easiest route to the host club.

GENERAL

- A. Following each event the Lakewood mixer committee chairman will furnish to MISGA:
 - a. A report with respect to Lakewood participation (if we hosted the mixer).
- b. Be sure to complete all parts of the MIXER REPORT form and forward 10% of gross receipts to MISGA's treasurer as stated therein.
- c. Each host club representative will retain a record of such "home" events for later consolidation and use with club management and MISGA.
