TOURNAMENT RESULTS

I. A - B - C - D TWO-MAN TEAM TOURNAMENTS

This year, for the first time, MISGA sponsored a series of four state-wide tournaments for two-man teams in four handicap divisions. These events were to be held in addition to the Divisional Championships at which the teams to play in the MISGA Championship were selected. Due to insufficient entries, the events scheduled for the "B" and "D" handicap divisions had to be cancelled. However, the Division "A" tournament at Lakewood, and the Division "C" event, at Brooke Manor were held as scheduled, although the number of entries at both these events were somewhat less than expected. Particularly disappointing was the fact that some clubs located quite nearby did not enter any teams in the competition. MISGA's Board of Directors will no doubt want to take a careful look at the situation and decide whether this series of tournaments should be scheduled again in 1984.

INDIVIDUAL CHAMPIONSHIPS II.

Division II, Mel Gesell, Director, and Division IV, Sam Hastings, Director, held individual championship tournaments for golfers in their respective Divisions in 1933. (Division II also held such an event in 1982). Both these tournaments were very successful and attracted large, enthusiastic fields. The Division II event, held at Sparrows Point C.C. on August 8th, had 100 entries, and the Division IV event, held at Fontgemery C.C. on July 14th, drew a field of 103.

Both these tournaments featured individual competition in four handicap divisions and generated a great deal of enthusiasm on the part of those who participated. Since most MISGA competition in recent years has involved two-man teams and most mixers have involved foursomes, the individual competition seemed to provide a welcome change of pace. Divisions II and IV strongly recommend that the other two divisions consider holding such an event in 1984.

FOUR BOARD MIMBERS COMPLETE THEIR TERMS OF CFFICE

On September 30th, four members of the MISGA Board of Directors - Mel Gesell of Piney Branch, Director of Division II; Dave Watson of Argyle, Division IV; Gill Williams of University of Maryland, Division III; and Bill Woolston of Hunt Valley, Division II, and MISGA's Immediate Past President - completed their terms on the Board. The other three members were not replaced, since the new NISGA constitution, adopted in 1982, provides for a smaller Board of Directors, with only eight voting members. MISGA PLANNING TRIP TO MEXICO

At the October 14th Board meeting, approval was given for a MISGA golfing trip to Mexico this winter. Tentative plans call for the group to leave BWI on January 31st and to return on February 8th. A total of 60seats will be available on the plane. The trip will include five days of golf. The approximate cost will be \$725 per person for golfers and \$650 per person for non-golfers, double occupancy, not including meals. Duane Swindle of Montgomery Village Country Club and a member of MISGA's Board of Directors, has a winter home in Guadalajara and will be helping to make the arrangements for the trip there. According to Duane, the weather in Guadalajara at that time of year is absolutely perfect, with no threat of rain. Complete details will be available in the very near future.

LET'S GO TO WAR AGAINST "SLOW PLAY" - A SELF-EXAMINATION

ON THE TEE: I.

Am I ready when it is my turn to play? If I have the honor, do I immediately know it and tee up at once?

AND ... Am I considerate of those with whom I share the golf course?

DURING FLAY OF THE HOLE: II.

Have I made decisions as to club selection, etc, before it is my turn to play? If my golf car companion is playing from a position a distance away from mine, have I taken two or three clubs and gone to my ball?

Do I have a second ball handy in case it is needed?

AND ... Am I considerate of those with whom I share the golf course?

ON THE GREEN: III.

When it is my turn to putt, have I already determined the line and am I ready to putt? Do I mark and clean my ball unnecessarily? In stroke play, do I putt out rather than marking my ball needlessly? Have we parked golf cars to the side of the green nearest to the next tee? Does the group leave the green as soon as we have putted out and wait to write the scores down at the next tee?

... Am I considerate of those with whom I share the golf course?

AND AT ALL TIMES: TV.

Do I take more practice swings than needed?

Do I stand over the ball too long?

Do I invite faster players through if the hole ahead is open?

AND ... Am I considerate of those with whom I share the golf course?
