PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"Based on our excellent growth, we found that a need for change brought us to a need for reorganization."

These are the words of Al Hagen, President Emeritus, taken from our MISGAgram #9, Jan. 1982. At that time we had 1,782 associates from 38 clubs. Roy Guazza reported at our last Board meeting that we now have 4.015 from 46 clubs.

It appears that history has repeated itself for the major problem that MISGA faces now is a realignment of clubs within divisions. After Waynesboro joined us, clubs in Division II asked for realignment so that travel the within divisions would be one or less. Travel time to Waynesboro from Sparrows Point and Chartwell would be about two hours (93 miles).

President Turner appointed Fred Shaffer to chair an ad hoc committee to study the problem and make a report to the Board. The committee consisted of the Directors of all MISGA divisions, John Turner, Dick Allchin, Marks Jaillite and Claude Widerman. Because I hosted the last two meetings at Crofton, I became slightly involved in the deliberations.

Fred's committee report at our July Board meeting recommended:

A. That Sparrows Point and Chartwell be moved to Div. III from II and that Hobbit's Glen move from III to II.

B. That the President appoint a new committee of associates other than Board members to recommend realignment of divisions foreseeing future expansion of MISGA. Both of these recommendations were approved.

One of the problems confronting Pred's committee was that our Constiion and By-laws are specifically

To allow for written for four divisions. future expansion, we must have more divions. I have asked the new chairman of our Policy and Planning Committee, Ted Branthover, to prepare changes to our Bylaws that will allow the Board to create new divisions. I hope that the Board can act on these changes at our next meeting so that we can present them at our annual Reps' meeting in April, 1991. If the Reps approve the changes with a two-thirds vote, our Realignment Committee can be free to recommend smaller divisions and the creation of new ones. You can see that the theme of the "President's Message" is Change and Growth.

Since I became a member of the Board, Roy Guazza, who succeeded Dick Quinn as Chairman of the Associates Committee, has asked division directors to appoint associate directors to receive and check all changes to the associates roster before sending them to him for entry into our computer files. This action greatly reduced errors in our printouts and mailing

George Lipscomb, our new Chairman of the Tournament Committee, reminds that Division Directors have been asked to appoint Division Tournament Directors to help him supervise MISGA events within their divisions. I think this is great! Decentralize and get a more efficient organization!

Continuing this chain of thought, you, EACH ASSOCIATE, have elected or approved the appointment of a MISGA Rep for your club; your Reps elected two Board members who elected me to be your President to serve from Oct. 1, 1990 to Sept. 30, 1991. In accordance with our By-laws, Article IV, I am your spokesman during my term of office. I plan to give you my ideas and hopes in this column. If you agree with me - fine. All I must do is convince the Board to agree with us. you disagree, let me hear from you. My address is 2476 Bell Branch Road, Gambrills, Md., 21054. PRESIDENT'S TOURNAMENT

1991 will see the inauguration of a President's Tournament with forty winners. That's places one through five in each of four flights, both net and gross. The event was born as a result of a splendfl gift of \$5,000 to MISGA last year. Part of the prize certificates will be paid for from the yearly interest that accrues from the gift. The receipt of the money and the plans for the tournament were approved by the club Reps at their meeting this year.

Division I will be the 1991 host, followed in order by Divisions II, III and IV. The format will be individual play and each division will run its

own qualifying tournament.

Tournament Chairman George Lipscomb announces that the regular Two-man Championship will be hosted by Division IV in 1991.


AL HAGEN
