WAKEFIELD VALLEY

Wakefield Valley, at Westminster, has been a great place to play with its beautiful setting, challenging layout, testing greens and vintage clubhouse (Circa 1767), but you should see it now! Not only has another handsome nine holes been added but a new clubhouse has been built that must have the members bursting with pride. It is large, well-proportioned, attractive and a delight from any point of view, from the banquet room to the dining areas, to the pro shop, the locker rooms, the works. And the setting remains spectacular.

The new nine, called "Gold", opens with a 330 yard test that features eleven sand traps, including two in the middle of the fairway and two around the green, one of them huge. Wakefield Valley re-

mains a happy test.



THEY EARNED IT

As our foursome neared the first hole on the course at Fort Dix as World War II wound down, we were alerted by several shouts of "FORE". The shouters sounded so near that we immediately hit the turf, then looked back and saw four G.I.s, in fatigues, about fifty yards away, holding WOODS, AND IN POSITION TO HIT AS A GROUP! I remembered a directive that I had read recently that advised that the first soldiers were being rotated from the Italian campaign and were to be encouraged to play golf as a means of helping them overcome any trauma. We left the course immediately, never to return; these soldiers had earned the right to use this playground. We learned that each had been given five clubs, a "Sunday" bag and three repainted golf balls. Their instruction consisted of being told to yell "FORE" before hitting, which they did with extraordinary enthusiasm. No shout that I have heard anywhere has matched theirs for volume or sincerity or has been for a better cause.
