OBITUARY

On December 1, 1993 MISGA lost a devoted Past President, Gil Williams, who gave 13 years of dedicated service to MISGA.

Gil was the principal moving force in organizing the University of Maryland Senior Association and became its first President in 1979. In this year University of Maryland joined MISGA. In 1980 he was appointed to the Operations Committee. Gil was elected to the Board became 1981 and Directors in Assistant Executive Director of MISGA. He was also appointed chairman of the Liaison Committee.

On February 11, 1981 Gil addressed a meeting of Crofton Country Club management personnel and the Club Seniors. His talk resulted in Crofton joining MISGA.

Gil was chairman of the Policy and Planning Committee in 1982 when MISGA changed its organization, eliminating the Executive Director. He and his committee wrote our present Constitution and By-Laws which were adopted by the Board of Directors on July 27, 1982.

In 1984 Gil was elected Director of Division III and served a second three year term on the Board of Directors. He became Vice President in 1985 and President in 1986. After he left the Board in 1987 he served on the Policy and Planning Committee and many other committees through the years until his cancer forced him to withdraw from committee service in 1993.

Gil was a great golfer and played to a single digit handicap. At his first Spring Fling in 1980 at Callaway Gardens Gil won low gross shooting 76 and 84, leading the field by 11 strokes. At age 70 Gil won the University of Maryland club championship in 1984.

Gil was very instrumental in inaugurating MISGA's Past Presidents

Tournament in 1991. At our first Division III qualifying round at Leisure World I was playing to a 9 handicap and shot a 76. Thought I had it made! When I posted my score, I noticed that Gil shot a 72 - leading the field by 4 strokes.

Gilbert T. Williams, 79, died of cancer at Holy Cross Hospital. He was a very dear friend to many of us. We'll all miss you Gil.


