Division III held the inaugural Five-Man Team (Pro-Am) Invitational Tournament at Tantallon Country Club on October 6, 1999. Participating in the competition were 18 club golf professionals and 72 MISGA Associates from the division's nine clubs.

For the event, each division club was invited to send two teams consisting of a professional and four MISGA amateurs (one each A, B, C, D player) from that club. The pro played his/her own ball. The four MISGA players played a scramble format in which the tee ball of each player was used at least twice. If the pro's score on any hole was better than the score of the amateur team, the team was able to record the pro's score as its own. However, the pro was not able to use the team score.

The purpose in holding the event was to demonstrate MISGA'S appreciation to the club professionals for their time and cooperation with the MISGA programs at their clubs. An added purpose was to foster closer relationships between the professional staff and the senior membership and to promote future cooperation.

### Letter to the editor - Handicaps

I was fascinated with the letters in the last edition. I suspect that some of the letters were in response to my letter of last February. If nothing else, I am sure the editor enjoys a spirited discussion to fill his pages! I will not continue the argument except to clarify my position. The MISGA computer does a good job of balancing teams, and I have been in the "money" for my fair share when the C and D players were playing well, but I have never felt that I contributed much to the team with a 14 handicap. (My "war story" from February could be repeated: shot a 77 at one event and finished 8 strokes out of the money and shot a 94 at another event and the team finished second.) The issue is not about money, which, as pointed out in a recent letter, is inconsequential. It is about feeling like you can help make a CONTRIBUTION to the team. I honestly do not feel that it makes any difference what I do.

I suggest that anyone responding to this, first read the USGA guidelines concerning multi-ball events which explains why high handicappers have such an advantage. If you are on the internet, check out <a href="https://www.usga.com/handicap/articles">www.usga.com/handicap/articles</a> for multi-ball events. Although it is a long article, one sentence says it all: "It is a golfing fact of life (a fact of which many players are unaware) that something less than full individual handicaps are necessary---for multi-ball events."

At Seaford we have recently twice run a MISGA format that other clubs might want to consider as an alternative to running two best-ball formats all the time. (Credit should go to Prospect Bay where we first encountered We basically played a modified Stableford SCRATCH (double bogeys = 1 point, bogeys = 2 points etc.). All balls in the foursome count. At the end, the team adds up its points and also adds up the handicaps of the four players to get its score. High score wins. Since this is not a multi-ball event as defined by the USGA, 100% of handicap is used. We have analyzed the results and do not see that it favors either low or high handicappers. The players seem to like it since everyone has to contribute. The teams that win are winning based on entire team effort rather than on one or two players having a hot day. The coordinator prefers it since it eliminates the time consuming card matching that is required to adjust teams with a blind score. In this format, the player who is used as a "blind" just has his point score plus his handicap added to the team that is missing a man. Card matching is not required. Final scores are tabulated very quickly. The negative appears to be that it takes approximately 15 minutes longer to play on average.

One last thought. One letter commented on sandbagging. Our club and several other clubs in our division have one person assigned for each event. His assignment is to collect and enter all scores from that event. That goes a long way towards ending sandbagging.



### Board Meeting Highlights - September 21, 1999

- 1. A motion was passed to recommend the use of 90% handicap at our mixers where two best-balls of four format is used.
- 2. A motion was passed to invite Past Presidents to participate in the ABCD State tournament. They will not have to qualify. They will be integrated into a flight according to their handicap.
- 3. A motion was passed to increase the Mixer prize money from \$4 to \$5, effective in 2000.
- 4. A motion was passed to increase the Division allocation from \$300 to \$400, beginning in 2000. This will be financed by increasing each club MISGA dues from \$25 to \$35.
