

MISGA welcomes Bretton Woods to Division IV.

The Bretton Woods Recreation Center is a private organization whose membership is constituted by employees of specified international organizations in the Washington, DC area.


Presiding over 285 scenic acres on the Potomac River and just 15 minutes from the Capital Beltway, Bretton Woods blends both convenient indoor and outdoor facilities.

It includes two spacious dining rooms complete with panoramic views and brick fireplaces, one restaurant, bar/game room, lockers, and pro-shop. The recreational facilities include three swimming pools, an 18-hole golf course, two soccer fields, a sand volleyball court, indoor and outdoor tennis and basketball, tether ball, horseshoes, badminton, miniature golf, roller blade trail, and two children's playgrounds. Sport professionals include swimming, tennis and golf pros and assistants.

Bretton Wood's 18-hole championship golf course challenges novices and experts alike. It is 6,663 yards long (par 71 - slope 127), designed by Ed Ault and it has been in play since 1968. The course has been home to the Maryland Open, Washington Metropolitan Golf Assoc. Amateur Championship, and several United Stated Golf Amateur Qualifiers.



# **SLOW PLAY REVISITED**

Now that I hoist a handicap blue pennant at the mizzen on my golf cart along with many other senior arthritic sufferers, I decided to review the delicate subject of slow play. As you grow older, it gets more delicate. However, slow play is still a round of golf that takes more than four hours and two Excedrins to complete.

The following tips apply:

- 1. Park the cart in back of the green for a quicker exit. Walk off briskly.
- 2. Play ready golf, forget the honor baloney.
- 3. Take the club you need and practice swings and be ready to play when it is safe.
- 4. Quit walking off yardage, check the markers or guess, and take off funny headcovers and leave 'em off. Does a putter really need a snood?
- 5. Putt out!! Don't wait around to line up your putt until others have made theirs.



- 6. Spend less time looking for a lost ball.
- 7. Extended pre-shot routines may be okay on the pro tour, but they are a pain and major contributor to slow play. One or two practice swings should suffice even if you are two down. The only person who benefits from a plumb bob is an architect.
- 8. Carry an extra ball, tee and ball marker in your pocket.
- 9. If your drive looks lost or OB, hit a provisional.
- 10. Record scores after you get to the next tee. Surely, you can remember them that long.
